#### From Pastor Leah—Dear Siblings in Christ,

One of the lectionary texts appointed for Thanksgiving is from Matthew 6:25-34, in which Jesus says, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than



food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" Then Jesus asks his disciples to "consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these." Instead, Jesus urges his followers to "seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be giving to you as well."

At the heart of the matter, Jesus is inviting us to take the risk to trust that God has given the world enough, freeing us from our worries to focus on the things that matter most in the kingdom of God—like justice and peace and whether our neighbor has what they need to live well and with dignity.

So how do we learn to trust in God's abundant provision in an anxious culture like ours that tries to motivate us—even manipulate us—by worry and fear to convince us that we are never enough, that we never have enough? Or in a political climate that tells us our neighbors among us are the problem? What Jesus is suggesting is so completely counter cultural to the voices telling us to acquire more stuff and stockpile it for ourselves to make us safer, more secure, and less afraid; to voices telling us to fear those with experiences different from our own. Sometimes we need divine intervention to see the heart of the matter.

Let us pray, "Come Holy Spirit!" May our eyes be opened to see and our hearts be ready to trust that God has got the whole world in God's hands. Help us to believe that God holds each precious one in God's very heart even in the midst of hard and painful things we cannot understand. God's love for you and for me and for our neighbor is infinite. There is no end to this love...it doesn't run out. It never gives up—not even at the point of death on a cross.

God's love is for you, and it is extravagant. God's love makes it possible to live an abundant life in communal solidarity with one another. God's love makes it possible for our hearts to be filled with gratitude and thanksgiving in place of worry and fear that robs us of the abundant life God intends for us.

You may gather with loved ones and slice up some delicious pies this month. A piece of the pie for this plate here, and a slice for someone else over there. Maybe a piece or two to send home with your guests for the day after Thanksgiving. But pretty soon, the pie plate will become empty. No more pie. Thanks be to God that love doesn't work that way! The more you slice up love and share it, the more there is. The pie dish never gets empty—it only overflows all the more. This is God's economy.

I was an aunt long before I was a mom. And I fell in love hard and fast when my niece was born. Oh, the first time I saw her I thought my heart would just burst with love. Then 18 months later my nephew was about to be born. I suddenly panicked. I began to worry...I couldn't imagine how I was going to split my love for my niece with this new baby. But, what a silly worry that was! The moment I laid eyes on my sweet newborn nephew and scooped him up in my arms, love didn't divide...it just kept expanding. It expanded again when I was pregnant with my first. And again when our son was born.

Love is outrageously abundant. Love is what frees us and makes us as bold as the birds and as daring as the lilies to embrace our fragility and vulnerability and trust God to care for us, and in turn care for our neighbors, through all life's joys and sorrows.

I think the practice of gratitude and thanksgiving work the same way. The more one gives thanks the more gratitude grows. The more that gratitude grows, the more praise and thanksgiving leaps from our lips. An attitude of gratitude opens our eyes to the abundance all around us to see God's love that frees us for so much more—to live as the people of God who have been raised to new life who live for one another without stopping to second guess or worry if there is enough for everyone.

This love makes it possible for us to look beyond ourselves and seek the well-being of our neighbors, focusing on their needs and concerns. You are free to live abundantly without fear or worry. You are free for the important work of the kingdom so that your neighbor may live abundantly in the kingdom, too. Thanks be to God!

#### From the Deacon's Desk: Gratitude Even When Life Hurts

Gratitude has been a timely theme for me in the past month. It was the theme of our Women's Retreat on October 4th, and also the theme for which I preached on Blessed to be a Blessing Sunday on October 19th. Given that it is also the month we celebrate Thanksgiving, it seemed to be a good topic to revisit.



I've talked before about the benefits to humans who make a practice out of gratitude: better mental and physical health; increased creativity; increased happiness, among others. But for many the reality of challenging circumstances in life make it difficult sometimes to focus on the being grateful. We discussed that at our Women's Retreat and I wanted to share with you one of the quotes that helped me in my planning for the retreat. It is from the Dutch Catholic priest and writer, Henri Nouwen:

"Gratitude is not a simple emotion or an obvious attitude. It is a difficult discipline in which I constantly reclaim my whole past as the concrete way God has led me to this moment and is sending me into the future. It is hard precisely because it challenges me to face my painful moments – experiences of rejection and abandonment, feelings of loss and failure – and gradually to discover in them the pruning hands of God purifying my heart for deeper love, stronger hope, and broader faith."


